Relaxing Commercialism's Control Forms Problem Broadcasters Must Meet to Hold Public

"TIME IS MONEY AND MONEY IS TIME, AND DON'T YOU BE FORGETTING IT; GET ALL THE MONEY THAT YOU CAN. BUT DON'T GET TIME FOR GETTING IT."

This old adage may be prophetic of radio, as we know it today. Radio will get Time for getting it unless tactics are changed. Radio today is controlled by the second hand of the clock. It may be from Bulova, time signals from Washington, or a loc dealer, but Time on the second hand is master of the situation.

Radio is a heart impulse, a soul impulse, if you please. If this is true. Time should not be a factor in radio. More people have been disappointed sitting in front of their radio sets because of the second hand than any other one influence. More radio talent have been heart-broken because of the clock hanging on the wall of the studio than by any "razz" letters that come in from the listeners-in.

COMMERCIALISM BLAMED

This is all due to commercialism.
The decision of Don Lee, owner of KHJ, is that spot announcements and fifteen-minute programs packed with merchandising and advertising matter will sound the death knell

radio unless a correction is made.
"I have just returned from a three months' cruise which carried me into Alaska, to the headwaters of the Columbia River and back down the coast to down the coast to our own master port of Los Angeles," said Lee. "The purpose of the trip was relaxation and rest. Yet because of my love of radio and my basic belief in it, I unconsciously entered into an intensive study of the problems of broadcast as they stand today.

"There are strange things done in the midnight sun.

"With three radio sets on board we made an intensive study and found that some of the most powerful stations in the United States would not click whereas other 500-watt stations at remote points came down the coast to our own master port of Los Angeles," said Lee. "The

most programs were inferior.

"The study of radio, from a reception standpoint in the Alaskan territory, represents a scientific problem which it may take years to master. The most serious problem of today is the perfection of broadcast from the standpoint of the public. You may not be able to get the distant station which you desire—that is the problem of science—but no matter what station you do get, you want that which is engrossing, entertaining and constructive.

The three months survey which I made convinced me of two things: Radio programs must originate at a point where talent is available. Undoubtedly one-half of the broadcast stations now operating in the United States do not come under this ruling.

"Wherever you find a lack of talent you also will find a minimized sponsorage. Radio like any other soul-stirring adjunct of life, must be paid for. The public is paying only by the purchase of a receiving set and for the monthly bill for electrical current. That is why I foresee, ultimately, a reduction in the number of stations."

"There is no answer to it. The
