Never in nine years' experience in radio has the writer met with a more whole-hearted or genuine response. It has been clearly and definitely indicated that followers of radio are more interested in this vital question then any other new before the public.

ters establishes definite trends of thought by this public regarding the question. Space will not permit a full analysis at this time of these letters but some of the high points backed by fair percentages of the total number writing in are as follows:

Restoration of patriotism and national loyalty is represented as highly essential for solving the unersployment situation. Expressions pointed out that loyalty to the nation has waned since the end of the World War "being supplanted by greed and selfishness."
