

# RADIO INTRIGUING WORLD BY PROGRAMS OF TODAY

## New York Philharmonic Orchestra, Churches of the Air and Other Great Features Scheduled

In days scarcely past, you, my dear reader, were regaled at the crib-side with stories of Little Red Riding Hood—yes and even Jack and the Beanstalk. Today science has substituted radio antenna for the beanstalk—and with your dial you can touch the heights and distances that would make Jack's beanstalk look like a daisy's stem: If my memory serves me, Jack crawled up that legume to run into a giant who didn't please him. So, too, at times you'll collide with an assortment of tenors, sopranos or hair-lipped orators that would make a giant look like real entertainment.

Yet—1932—in fact, today, is pouring into the wave lanes a wealth of entertainment you can't afford to miss.

When the baton is raised over the New York Philharmonic Orchestra at 12 noon today the nation will be flooded with music to be had a few years ago at a price prohibitive to the world at large.

The efforts of all the disciples of olden days, of the missionaries of today, dwindle in comparison to the great good the national network churches of the air are accomplishing. In this regard—note the debut of Columbia's Church of the Air over KHJ at 11:30 a.m. The prelates of every major religious organization of the land bring into the home the word of God in a fashion no other invention of man could achieve.

Folk far removed from their homelands listen to international messages from their rulers of other days and sing with their compatriots before a Christmas tree far removed from these United States. Or, as witness tonight—KNX at 10:15—the invisible thousands who will tune in to greet Italian night at the Paris Inn. Few sets in Little Italy will forego the pleasure of listening to their countrymen and countrywomen make a merry riot of the annual jinks of the Italian members of the Los Angeles Lodge, No. 99, the B.P.O.E. In a setting replete with the memories of other years, Dave Mack and the Paris Inn orchestra will swing into the spirit of the night—with Jack Carter, Bert Rovers and the Italian singing sisters closing the doors upon this country's traffic signals—and opening them to an ancient homeland.

"The Political Situation in Washington Tonight"—a pipe line into the national Capitol with Frederick William Wile. "Eternal vigilance is the price of liberty" should be enough to warrant your dailiness to these talks.

Television! Much smoke and little fire—as yet. It is and it isn't. You may awake some morning to find it ready for installation. Then again you may not. Don't lie awake nights—or put off buying a radio fearing television will make it obsolete.

Lorna Ladd has sounded the first blast of a series of presentations: "your favorite radio characters." KFAC. Crooner or mortician—we'll entice them all to the mike.

Keep an eye on The Times Forum periods—KHJ—at 1:30 every day except Sunday. They bring to you the leading figures of the city county, State and national governments.

If you haven't listened to Columbia's "March of Time" with its dramatized news events—ask the policeman, the milk man or—well, think of fish—then Friday—then KHJ—at 1:30 p.m. It can't be beat.

The public is not yet reconciled to organists who choose merry-go-round music for that instrument.

When Bing Crosby, Alex Gray and Morton Downey churn the air with "I Love You, Dear," or some other triple-plated ballad, many more telephones than you'd dream go into action—pouting lovers making up.

If radio stations capitulated and broadcast for every lost dog, husky, band, wife, child, temper and pocketbook—you'd be inclined to believe half the world was looking for the other half.

Here's a letter just received: "Pittiwitz went for a ride on top of some one's ear Christmas night and hasn't returned. Make our New Year's start happy. Broadcast or plea. We can't throw away a nice big plate of turkey bones." Yes, Pittiwitz is a maseuline eat. His owner tells us he never caught a bird or scratched a child. But did love to sit on the tops of automobiles. We pittiwitz—but auto stay home.

Analysis of a typical N.B.C. broadcast month showed the following program percentages: Music 69 per cent; literature, 11.8; educational, 21.3; religion, 2.5; and novelties, 1.5. Persons participating in broadcasts totaled, 291,263.
