

# ACTUAL BATTLE TOLD ON RADIO

Broadcast From Scene Sets New Mark in History

Running Story in English Followed by Summary

Future May Hold Greater Shocks for Listeners

Perhaps the greatest novelty in the history of radio—at least of its late history—was a broadcast direct from the battlefield in Manchuria. To all who listened in was brought not only the sound of conflict but a running description in English and a report on it by one of the foreign generals in the vernacular. It was startling, and in a way epochal.

But to those who provide "acts" for radio, it was just one more event. Radio has long since recognized that its field is the world—not merely the world of entertainment as such, but the whole broad field of human interest. No matter what sort of thing happens there are millions who wish to know about it right then and there. And only through radio can this demand be supplied.

### HOW FAR?

While radio so far has been limited to this earth, our own mundane sphere, there are those who believe that eventually its power of transmission will be extended to the celestial regions as well. They think—and who shall deny them?—that sooner or later we shall hear "the morning stars sing together" and the rush of stars through the outer spaces. While that seems chimerical today didn't radio as such seem just as impossible a few years back?

We shall see—hear, rather—what we shall hear. We dream dreams and they come true. No one living can't or has set a limit on the extent to which radio yet may go. Listen in: you'll be surprised, some day.

The oldest broadcaster in continuous service on the Pacific Coast is Dr. Walter Sylvester Hertzog, who will have been heard for eight years from KHJ, Los Angeles, on the 24th inst., delivering in that time 1000 addresses and about 3,000,000 words.

Head of the American history division of the Department of Education, Dr. Hertzog was one of the first to broadcast on the city's oldest program-giving station. He spoke for 560 nights in succession, his talks being based on source material from thirty-two historical volumes.

Three hundred disabled World War veterans start to work tomorrow evening as "Broadcast Reporters" on principal radio stations in the United States and Canada for Radio Network Surveys, Inc., New York City, a new organization developed to report on radio station service and to gather and analyze original data pertaining to various aspects of radio broadcasting. The activities of the field personnel, which reports to headquarters in New York, cover the United States and Canada. Over 90 per cent of the men employed to report on radio broadcasting are disabled veterans, who because of their disability are unable to engage in any occupation outside of their homes.

The realism of the "March of Time" over Columbia is traditional, but tangible evidence was received recently when a Detroit mother wrote complaining of the effect of a broadcast on her 7-year-old son. He had, it seemed, listened to a reenactment of the situation in the Orient and then had gone to bed to have a nightmare in which the family laundryman was chasing him down the street "with China's most terrible weapon—the boycott."
