Outstanding Programs

A RARE OPPORTUNITY to see on film a show you may have missed on your TV screen will come this Monday night at 8:30 p. m. when films of both of the "Experiment in Economics" programs will be shown in the Community Room of The Washington Post, 1515 L St. N.W.

The two half-hour films will be shown primarily for economists and television producers interested in methods to make the abstract subject of economics graphic and substantial on TV. (A girl's nylon-clad leg was one attractive gimmick used.) Any interested member of the public is invited, however.

The series was originally shown on WTOP-TV in November and was produced as an experiment in teaching economics for the Committee for Economic Development with narration by Alfred Friendly, an assistant managing editor of The Washington Post, and discussions by leading economists.


