

Radio: Clark Gable Plays Lead In Radio Theater Drama

Screenland comes to the radio tonight en masse, when Clark Gable, Josephine Hutchinson and Adolphe Menjou appear in the Radio Theater presentation of "Farewell to Arms," over WENR at 9 p. m. The story, which was taken from Ernest Hemingway's novel of the same name, tells a tragic story of a man and woman separated by the World War. Clark Gable as Henry, an American in the Italian ambulance corps, and Josephine Hutchinson as Catherine, an English nurse, are separated by the war, with their letters intercepted by the censors. They are reunited far from the front just before Catherine's death. This is Gable's third appearance in Radio Theater. His most recent was the Hollywood premier of the program last June.

(State Journal News Service) COBB—More than 300 residents of Cobb, town of Eden, and town of Linden crowded the Cobb opera house Friday night and despite strong opposition voted to combine the village school district with the town of Eden and part of Linden and to go forward with plans for construction of a new \$67,000 school building. R. C. Wonn, school board chairman, presided and opened the question of consolidation for discussion. Glen James, town chairman of Eden, A. E. Thomas, and Oscar Knudson pointed out defects in the plan. Henry Nagel spoke briefly in favor of consolidation and moved that the districts be combined and that the school board should ask for a federal grant. The vote stood 263 for consolidation, 39 against. In the afternoon residents of the village of Cobb school district held in favor of the plan 111 to 3. Atty. J. E.
