Streamlined Lakes Ship Is Planned

MILWAUKEE—(U.P.)—Construction of a \$1,000,000 streamlined passenger ship for service between Milwaukee and Muskegon, Mich., was planned today by officials of the Wisconsin and Michigan Steamship Co. The proposed vessel would be the fastest on the Great Lakes. It would cross Lake Michigan in less than four hours as compared with the present schedule of six hours and 45 minutes. It was announced that the speed of the new ship would be 45 miles per hour as compared with the average of 14 miles an hour now attained by trans-lake ships. The new ship probably will be ready for service in 1938, company officers said.

Says Savings Only Can Cut Realty Taxes

"Possibility of reducing real estate taxes without reducing government costs is extremely remote," Paul N. Reynolds, executive director of the Wisconsin Taxpayers Alliance, told the Madison Real Estate board at a meeting Friday noon at the Olympic restaurant. The main barrier in the way of real estate tax reduction, according to Mr. Reynolds, are the high cost of local government, the grabbing of taxes other than real estate revenues by the state and federal governments, and the tendency of citizens to demand more services from local government.
