

Radio: UP Foreign Correspondent Tells of Spanish War

Webb Miller, European manager of the United Press Association, will discuss "The Situation in Spain," Saturday, at 9:15 a. m. over WIBA and WMAQ. Miller's address will be broadcast from the National Press Club in Washington, D. C., as a feature of the annual meeting of the American Society of Newspaper Editors. The University of Wisconsin boxing squad makes its last stand of the season in Pullman, Wash., tonight, against the University of Washington team, but WIBA listeners will be able to follow the bouts in a special broadcast starting at 10:45.

Collegiate Boxing Rules Show Need for Clarification

SACRAMENTO, Cal.—(AP)—The rules committee of the National Collegiate Athletic association has an important job of clarification or revision ahead before the 1938 western championships, particularly if western champions defend their titles next year.

Either the rules will have to be revised or the westerners will have to forget about infighting, it developed definitely from the 1937 tournament staged at Sacramento. It was a painful but comic expression which flashed frequently across the features of stocky John Murray, Clemson College's 125-pound title aspirant, on the first night of the three-night tournament which started the discussion expected to bring forth a definite pronouncement of policy from NCAA officials.

Easterners Protest
Murray was battling Paul Waller, Washington State College youth, who likes to stay in close and work on his opponent's body. The tactics brought expressions of pain, shock and amazement to Murray's face and prompted imploring gestures to the referee. Fans, who seemed to know more of the burlesque of the wrestling ring than of the national rules for college boxing, laughed and shouted.

What they didn't know was that national regulations prescribe that as soon as either contestant has one arm tied up, a break is in order and it is against the rules to punch an opponent who does not have both arms free.

A majority of the Pacific Coast fighters similarly uninformed on this rule, or at least unused to practicing it in coast competition, slowed up eastern and southern opponents by working on the body in clinches. The first night brought 300 strenuous protests from visiting coaches that second night violations were less frequent. The finals found most of the coast representatives refraining from throwing leather in the clinches, although inadvertent punches, born of instinct, occasionally slipped.

Coaches Blame Code
A scattered few of the visiting coaches, temporarily angered over what they considered poor decisions and failure to take the rule violations into account, threatened protests. All agreed in calmer moments, however, that a hard and fast national statement of policy must be forthcoming from the rules committee before another tournament is conducted.

University of Maryland's coach, Heinie Miller, summarized the views of a majority of eastern and southern officials in commenting on the performances of Benny Alperstein, his southpaw protégé who won the 135-pound championship, and Carl Eckstrom, University of North Dakota's dynamite who
