Appreciation Course Starts on Air Friday

NEW YORK—The NBC Music Appreciation hour, conducted by Dr. Walter Damrosch, dean of American music teachers, will inaugurate its tenth season of weekly broadcasts on Friday,

Following the schedule of the past season, which was estab-lished in order to make the course available to the greatest number of schools throughout the country, the broadcasts will be presented from 1 to 2 p. m., over both NBC networks.

Policy Continued Also continuing the policy of past years, the progressive course will consist of four series of concerts—A, B. C and D designed in their musical content, with accompanying explanation by Dr. Damrosch to meet the requirements of different age levels.

Series A and C. for Grades and 4, and Grades 7, 8 and 9, respectively, will occupy the first half-hour of the broadcasts on alternate weeks. Series B and D, for Grades 5 and 6, and high achools and colleges, respective-ly, will be presented on alternate weeks during the concluding half-hour,

Instructor's Manuals and Student's Notebooks will be available as formerly to the schools and public. The Manual, a general guide to teachers, prepared by Dr. Damrosch and Lawrence Abbott, will contain explanatory notes, thematic illustrations and biographical information on all four series of concerts. The Notebooks, one for each series, prepared by Charles H. Farms-worth and Lawrence Abbott, will contain tests, thematic illustrations, composers' portraits and blank pages for notes and clippings.

"This year I have introduced more operatic music than has been included in seasons past," Dr. Damrosch said. "There will be a program entitled 'The Opera' in Series C; in Series D the program devoted to early composers will include operatio as well as choral polyphonic works; and in the Wagner pro-gram I have included an important part of the first act of 'Die Walkure', Last year's innovation of including two little radio dramas based on incidents in the lives of famous composers will be continued in Series C and D."

Bi-Weekly Lessons As in previous seasons, half hour programs in each series will be broadcast bi-weekly. On Friday, October 15, Lesson One of Series A will be broadcast during the first half hour and the first lesson of Series B in the second half hour. The following Friday, Series C and D will be inaugurated. The consecutive lessons in each series will be brondoust on alternate Fridays. Since Dr. Damrosch opened the first program of the famous

series in the fall of 1928, a whole generation of children in city and country schools has passed through the courses in the progressive instruction, learning the three "B's" of music — Bach, Beethoven and Brahms—as they learned their three "R's" of

From the 1928 audience, extimated at 1,000,000, the number listening in at home and in school and college classes has grown over the past nine-year period to approximately 7,000,000.




