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# Madison, Lodi Men to Be Stock Judges

Two Wisconsin men, Ralph Reynolds, Lodi, and A. E. Darlow, Madison, are numbered among the judges of entries in the 1937 International Live Stock Exposition and Horse show to be held at the Chicago stock yards Nov. 27 to Dec. 4.

Reynolds is slated to judge short-horn cattle while Darlow will judge lambs in the junior feeding contest.

Nearly 14,000 head of animals from 15 states will be shown at the 38th anniversary of the exhibition. Major features at the exposition will be the 19th International Hay and Grain show, the world's largest farm crops exhibition and the 16th national 4-H club congress.

Alexander Ritchie, a Scotchman, manager of the royal farms at Windsor, England, will judge all breeds of steers at the show. He will make the trip by special permission of King George of England, owner of the royal farms, and succeeds another Scot, Walter Biggar, who made 12 trips to the United States to judge entries in this division.

Growers from 21 states, four provinces of Canada, and Australia have sent entries to date for the crops show. Farm youths from more than 40 states will attend the 4-H club congress. They represent the pick of a million boys and girls on American farms who are enrolled in the organization.

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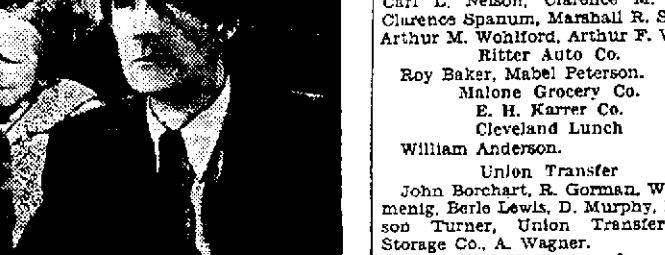

MARGARET'S BAY, KENT, Eng.—(UP)—Sir Johnston Forbes-Robertson, one of the greatest Shakespearean actors, who thrilled American audiences with his "Hamlet" and other roles, died today at the age of 84. He had appeared in so many plays that his record in "Who's Who in the Theater" covers nearly three pages. He made his first appearance in 1874 and his final one in 1927 in "Twelfth Night" in London.
