of orchestral compositions by Anterican composers was an nounced by the Juilliard School of Music here. Through these competitions the school selects each year one or more orchestral works and pays for their publication, with the composer receiving all royalties and fees accruing from the sale or per-formance of the work.

The competition is limited to compositions by native or nat-uralized American citizens and only such orchestral compositions as are suitable for performance by a major symphony orchestra will be considered. They must be compositions of which the composer owns or controls the copyright.
