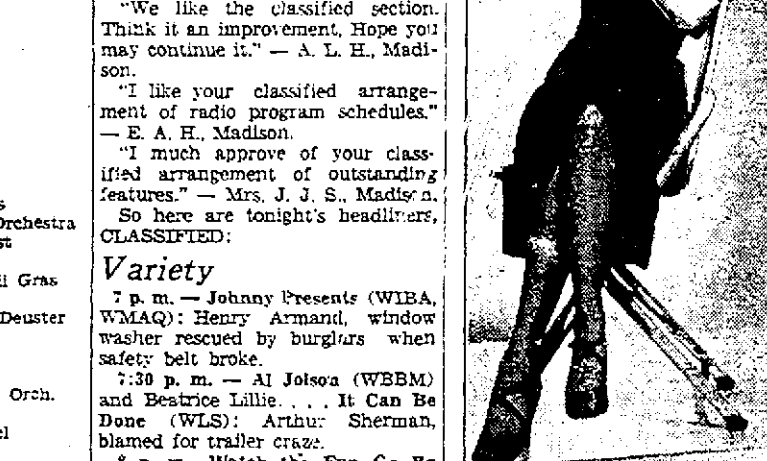

He Takes a Chance for Science

HAVANA, CUBA (AP)—A little, grey-haired physician sat in his study here today occasionally rubbing several little hard spots on his left arm which eventually cause his death from cancer.
But to Dr. Matias Duque, Cuba's first secretary of public health, these little risings under his skin meant something more important than the life of one human being.
"He Hopes..."
He hopes they will prove his theory that cancer may be transmitted from one person to another by direct inoculation and thus provide a specific clue for the development of a cure for the disease that takes hundreds of lives annually.
Last October 9th the 70-year-old doctor became a voluntary "human guinea pig" for cancer experiment. He had himself inoculated four times with "filtrates of cancerous elements" taken from a cancerous tumor removed from a woman patient.



"Developing..."
Small subcutaneous hardnesses are now appearing where he was inoculated. They have been developing slowly for nearly a month.
Dr. Duque says he cannot yet classify the little clots, but believes they may be the beginning of a cancerous growth.
The doctor gave up regular practice years ago to devote the rest of his life to cancer research, after two members of his family died from the disease.

SPEED WITH SAFETY URGED

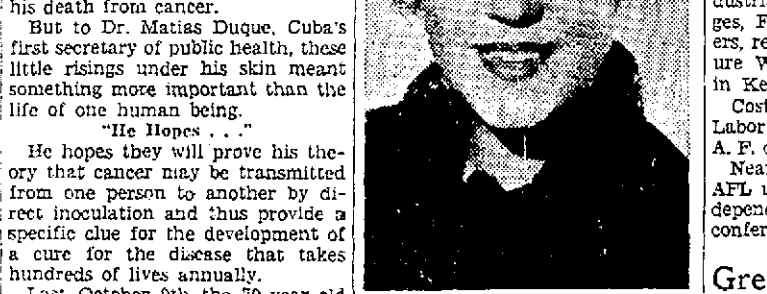
