Tri-County high school league bas-ketball teams open their race this week with four games, the first of which matches Sauk City and Waunakee at Prairie du Sac Wednesday night. Mazomanie is at Spring Green, Lodi at Prairie du Sac, and Black Earth at Arena Friday night. Spring Green, Mazomanie, and Lodi, the latter undisputed champion last season, are chief contenders for the championship this year. Arena is the "darkhorse" and Sauk City, Waunakee, Prairie du Sac, and Black Eeath are the weaker teams. Lodi has a veteran team with lettermen at all positions. It is expected to be a top-notch contender for the crown it won with ten straight wins last season. Moran, Fellows, Nelson, Thompson, Schmiedlin, Moul, Maney and Goeres are the lettermen but Maney and Goeres have been out of the lineup for the past week.

Three lettermen form the back-bone of Spring Green's team that is expected to make a great bid for honors. They are Billy Cork, Cyril Rach, and Bob Joiner. Rach counted 21 points Saturday night as the

team beat Richland Center, 27-21. Charley Royston is the lone letterman back at Mazomanie but a strong Maroon team is expected. Sauk City also has only one letterman, Tony Endres is the Cardinal emblem wearer. Black Earth is without lettermen and has suffered several one-sided drubbings in preliminary games. Three lettermen carry Prairie du

Sac's hopes. They are Wayne Page Carl Hutter, and Leroy Schneller. Waunakee has only one letterman Andy Kessnich: its chances hinge on the performances of four midget sophomores, Slack, Murphy, Lloyd Otteson and Marsh.

Arena also has three lettermen, Cowling, Hottman, and Winch, and may be the team that really determines the champion.




