Mexico Views 3-Year Reform Rule as Firm

By WILLIAM H. LANDER (United Press Staff Correspondent) MEXICO, D. F. —U.R.— Lazaro Cardenas del Rio has reached the middle of his six-year term as president of the United Mexican States. During his three years in office,

Cardenas has made strides in his socialistic program of betterment of the masses. Many phases of his ad-ministration have aroused opposition, which, however, found no cohesion and no leadership. The present administration started on Nov. 30, 1934. Cardenas succeeded the "provisional president"

Gen, Albelardo Rodriguez, in whose cabinet he served as minister of war the presidency. Cardenas already has held office longer than any one of his three predecessors—Gen. Rodriguez, Gen. Pascual Ortiz Rubio and Emilio

Portes Gil, who all three together serves only six years. . Cardenas Only 42 As the begins the second half of his term, Cardenas is still youngbeing only 42 years old, and is probably the most vigorous man in all Mexico. He has a prodigious resistance; is a great horseback rider and swimmer; often works from 5 a.m. far into the night.

The president does not smoke or drink, and does not like social events. so that the use of . tailcoats, and even dinner jackets at state func-tions has all but disappeared. In the old days, dressing was in order even for sessions of congress. Many changes in the political map of Mexico have been effected under President Cardenas. The principal one has been the overthrow of the dictatorship of Gen. Plutarco Elias Galles, who had been

General Alvaro Obregon in July 1928. The clash between Calles and Cardenas, which apparently start-ed and ended with extraordinary rapidity in June, 1935, in reality had its origin in events which occurred much before that.

Was PoPular Candidate

In 1913, when it began to be rumored that Calles would choose ex-minister of foreign affaires Gen. Manuel Perez Trevino as the official candidate of the PNR (National Revolutionary Party) for president, a strong popular movement in be-half of the candidacy of Cardenas surged forward. In the Chamber of Deputies the late Froylan Manjarrez was one of the leading Cardenistas. The small Mexican labor party formally placed Cardenas' name in nomination for president,


Later, in the state of San Luis Potosi, the then powerful Gen. Saturnino Cedillo rose at an agrarian convention and said that he would defend Cardenas' candidacy against all comers. As the avalanche in favor of Cardenas swept forward, Perez Trevino withdrew his candidacy, and urged everybody to sup-port Cardenas "for the sake of party harmony."

Thus in December, 1933, the party convention unanimously nominated Cardenas for president, and adopted the famous "Six-Year Plan," which, although it nominally went into effect in January, 1934, in reality it began to be vigorously pushed for-word when Cardenas took office three years ago.


