Coasting Hills Are Designated by Council

Coasting hills in various parts of the city were designated by the common council Monday night. Streets that are not heavily traveled were selected and Harry C. Thompson, director of recreation, announced that it is also planned to establish slides in parks, on school grounds and in B. B. Clarke park. City Atty. Francis Lamb advised that under the law the city is required to put up barriers and lanterns but that there is no liability on its part in case of an accident. All coasting hills will be closed to traffic from 3:30 to 9 p. m. on school days and from 1 to 9 p. m. on Saturdays, Sundays and holidays. Hills have been designated on Oneida pl., Gregory, Edgewood ave., S. Orchard, Fisher, Lakeland ave., Rusk, S. Brooks, and Chestnut. After a public hearing had been held, action was postponed on an ordinance to change seven lots at Nakoma rd. and Seminole highway and one lot on Seminole from residential to D commercial district. Mrs. H. M. Lampert, W. H. Negley, Paul C. Winner, R. W. Nelson and others spoke against the change. "There is no desire on the part of the residents in the district to have a business area established," Mrs. Lampert said. Atty. Emerson Ela, representing the bondholders protective committee of the Cherokee Realty co., urged passage of the ordinance. He argued that the lots on Nakoma rd. were originally platted for business purposes, that people of humble means made small investments in bonds of the realty company, and that unless the property could be sold for business they are to lose their money. He scoffed at reports that a filling station might be erected in view of the fact that consent of property owners within 200 feet must be obtained. Ela estimated that the property is worth about \$4,500 and that about \$2,000 in taxes is due the city. On motion of Aid. Walter L. Plaerent, the ordinance was referred back to the city planning commission. On recommendation of the finance committee, the council voted to set aside all revenues at the Monona golf course in excess of disbursements for paying off the principal of the purchase price and the interest. Aid. Henry C. Wolf, committee chairman, explained that during the past season the revenues were \$3,045 in excess of the disbursements and that \$2,327 remained in the fund after principal, interest and insurance had been paid. On Jan. 1 another \$500 on principal and over \$900 in interest becomes due.

Mexico Views 3-Year Reform Rule as Firm

By WILLIAM H. LANDER (United Press Staff Correspondent) MEXICO, D. F., (AP) - Lazaro Cardenas del Rio has reached the middle of his six-year term as president of the United Mexican States. During his three years in office, Cardenas has made strides in his socialist program of betterment of the masses. Many phases of his administration have aroused opposition, which, however, found no cohesion and no leadership. The present administration started on Nov. 30, 1934. Cardenas succeeded the "provisional president" Gen. Alvaro Obregon, in whose cabinet he served as minister of war the presidency.

Cardenas already has held office longer than any one of his three predecessors—Gen. Obregon, Gen. Pascual Ortiz Rubio and Emilio Portes Gil, who all three together served only six years. As he begins the second half of his term, Cardenas is still young—being only 42 years old, and is probably the most vigorous man in all Mexico. He has a prodigious resistance; is a great horseback rider and swimmer; often works from 5 a. m. far into the night. The president does not smoke or drink, and does not like social events, so that the use of tullecoats, and even dinner jackets at state functions has all but disappeared. In the old days, dressing was in order even for sessions of congress. Many changes in the political map of Mexico have been effected under President Cardenas. The principal one has been the overthrow of the dictatorship of Gen. Plutarco Elias Calles, who had been the power behind the throne since the assassination of President-elect General Alvaro Obregon in July 1928. The clash between Calles and Cardenas, which apparently started and ended with extraordinary rapidity in June, 1935, in reality had its origin in events which occurred much before that. Was Popular Candidate In 1913, when it began to be rumored that Calles would choose ex-minister of foreign affairs Gen. Manuel Perez Trevino as the official candidate of the PNR (National Revolutionary Party) for president, a strong popular movement in behalf of the candidacy of Cardenas surged forward. In the Chamber of Deputies the late Profron Manjarrez was one of the leading Cardenistas. The small Mexican labor party formally placed Cardenas' name in nomination for president. Later, in the state of San Luis Potosi, the then powerful Gen. Saturnino Cedillo rose at an agricultural convention and said that he would defend Cardenas' candidacy against all comers. As the avalanche in favor of Cardenas swept forward, Perez Trevino withdrew his candidacy, and urged everybody to support Cardenas "for the sake of party harmony." Thus in December, 1933, the party convention unanimously nominated Cardenas for president, and adopted the famous "Six-Year Plan," which, although it nominally went into effect in January, 1934, in reality it began to be vigorously pushed forward when Cardenas took office three years ago. Calls Out of Country During the first few months of Cardenas' administration, Calles was in California for medical treatment. He remarked that it looked like a "marathon of radicalism" had broken out. "The country needs spiritual tranquility," he said in a statement. He said that there were now two groups—one of "Callistas" and one of "Cardenistas," and he recalled that a similar division between his followers and those of Ortiz Rubio followed that President's resignation in 1929. Cardenas, however, was prepared for the crisis. He reminded the
