### Big Meetings Scheduled for City in '38

At the end of the new year's first week, Madison already has 24 conventions and other large meetings scheduled for 1938, according to the Madison and Wisconsin Foundation.

Meetings are scheduled in January through November, and represent the first result of a civic drive to surpass the total of 218 conventions and other meetings held in the city during 1937.

Last year, such meetings brought \$1,437,675 to the city, according to figures compiled by the foundation, and were attended by a total of 57,507 persons. Convention money spent here is soon distributed throughout the city for food supplies, services, utilities, insurance and taxes, the foundation pointed out, and reported that one hotel spent more than \$25,000 here for service and supplies in a month's time.

The total spent in Madison by convention delegates was figured on the basis of an annual daily expense of \$10 for each delegate and an average convention length of two and a half days, as estimated by the National Convention bureau.

### According to CULBERTSON

The only reason for drawing the defenders' trumps as quickly as possible is to prevent them from ruffing the declarer's side tricks. It naturally follows that when there are no side suit tricks, or when they are at best potential, requiring establishment, there is no logic in rushing to draw trumps. Today's hand is one type in which trump drawing should be deferred.

The bidding:

West opened the club eight. East's jack lost to the ace and declarer took stock of his resources. The losing tricks appeared to be one club, two

diamonds, and two hearts, assuming that no spade-tricks need be lost and that the heart ace is "on side." The only side suit tricks readily available to declarer were the diamond ace and heart king, and these could not get away. There was no need to protect them by drawing the opponents' trumps. Declarer saw how he might make an extra trick if the opponents were not too alert.

Having nothing to lose by trying, declarer led a low diamond toward dummy. West split his honors, the ace won, and a diamond was returned. East ducked and the king won. West, seeing no need for a shift, continued with clubs. East's queen won, and now East, not knowing where the last club was, laid down the club king. Declarer ruffed, drew the outstanding spades in three rounds, and then led a third diamond. East's queen won and now the heart shift came-too late. After cashing the ace East led a low heart. Declarer hopped up with the king and cashed his thirteenth diamond, discarding dummy's losing heart.

True, the defenders had cooperated nobly by their failure to shift to hearts before losing their last diamond stopper. But, at least, declarer had done his part in trying for an extra trick in the only way available.
