Big Meetings Scheduled for City in '38

At the end of the new year's first week, Madison already has 24 conventions and other large meetings scheduled for 1938, according to the Madison and Wisconsin Founda-

Meetings are scheduled in January through November, and represent the first result of a civic drive to surpass the total of 216 conventions and other meetings held in the city during 1937.

Last year, such meetings brought \$1,437,675 to the city, according to figures compiled by the founda-tion, and were attended by a total of 57,507 persons. Convention money spent here is soon distributed throughout the city for food supservices, utilities, insurance plies. and taxes, the foundation pointed out, and reported that one hotel spent more than \$25,000 here for service and supplies in a month's

The total spent in Madison by convention delegates was figured on the basis of an annual daily expense and a half days, as estimated by the National Convention bureau.
