

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SUN VALLEY, Idaho: last round-up from the little black notebook on account of I'll be home by the time this gets in the paper.

THE SKI lifts on the three mountains here are different from any others in the world and were designed especially to suit the conditions, by Union Pacific engineers who got their ideas from banana carriers in the jungles of Guatamala.

SUN VALLEY lodge, which is a gigantic building made entirely of reinforced concrete and steel, inside and out, and was apparently built to outlast the pyramids, was started on May 20 and opened to the public. complete, on December 21, 1936 a record breaking job.

4 4 4 Challenger Inn was started the beginning of June, 1937, but the contractors had to stop and build a dam and a stadium for the rodeo so that they really didn't start building until the middle of September and it was finished on December 21, (You see. Mr. Harriman gets an idea and announces to the world that it will be all built and ready by a certain date and then it's up to the engineers to keep his word. And they do.)

The lodge will house 280 guests and the inn 400, while there are 396 employes not counting those in the special shops which are rented to outside firms.

THE MOST curious piece of equipment here is a new spe-cially-built single-fread tractor with a broad caterpillar belt which revolves around the whole machine after the manner of war tanks used in France. and a long sled which holds 25 people pivoted on behind to act as a rudder-type steerer, which is used to transport passengers and pull other sleds and toboggans up hills . . . and it can get through anyplace no matter how deep the snow or how high the drifts, besides being able to climb straight up a 40% hill with the big sled and several smaller ones on behind.

4 4 4 The series of peaks right around Sun Valley aren't the only skiing places available to guests here: Wood River valley, which begins here, is 25 miles long, runs a complete gamut of ski facilities, and is considered "Sun Valley's back yard".

With the latest improvements here complete, Sun Valley is the only ski site on this continent having official courses covering the four main events in skiling: downhill, cross country, slalom, and jumping, and all laid out according to specifications of the International Federation of no, the highest organization in the world. In other words, Bun Valley is now eligible for an official F. I. S. tourney, the results of which determine the true world titles in skiing and which has never, thus far, been held outside the European Aips and Scandinavia

Y., and Palm Springs, Cal.) has one of the most beautiful, smartest and most luxurious interiors I've ever seen in a public place. It is strictly modern in design, with some walls of natural rubbed birch and others of a soft jade green. The fireplace in the **GIVE CLOTHES**

main room is about three feet high and eight feet long, set flush into a birch wall and with a two inch strip of burnished brass around its edge as the only adornment. There are several niches in the walls containing exquisite statutes or vases, and original etchings, several paintings in the modern (but not surrealistic) manner, form the only other decorations. The owners themselves say it is the finest of all their four places.

Everything in the place was especially made for the Christiana and the real monogrammed Irish linen, the service plates . . . of an off-white china similar to Chinese porcelain with skifers etched in black on them and the elaborate service (as well as the high prices) have the natives (even the ones who have been places and seen things) all agog. Iowa Bang's Plan Good, Says Tyson (State Journal News Service)

DODGEVILLE - George Tyson,

Dodgeville veterinarian and coroner, Friday issued a statement in defense of the proposed Iowa county Bang's disease control program. "The Bang's test is unquestionably

accurate and a good thing. I think the county will adopt the program, Tyson said. "There is no truth in the asser-

tion that V. S. Larson, assistant state veterinarian, dominated the countywide Bang's meeting here Jan. 7. In fact, opponents of the Bang's test asked so many questions of Larson that other parties did not have a chance to discuss the merits

"Larson was asked to come here by the county agricultural committee. He explained all angles of the area test very satisfactorily. "The Bang's test is not being

pushed down anybody's throat. Already about 500 of the 2,600 herds of cattle in the county are under supervision, and more are signing up every day. If 75 per cent of the cattlemen in the county sign up, all herds will be tested. No one has to sign,

"The test is a good thing. Nearly all veterinarians in 48 states are for it. It's just as good as the tuberculin test for cattle.

"Why wait for 75 per cent of the counties to sign for the program? Then we'd come under the law any-

way. We might as well get in on the beginning. Six counties have signed up since the law was passed last fall, and I think we should be the next." Here's a Village
