## Colonel Ruppert Scoffs at Idea of Razing Yankees

Following is the fifth of a series of winter baseball stories.

NEW YORK — (UPI)—The New York Yankees have become the problem club of baseball. The other American League clubs can't beat the Yanks and in the past two world series the National league's best club has looked pitiful in comparison.

Ford Frick, National League president, says the Yanks are becoming a serious menace to baseball and should be dismantled, says the American Olympic Committee, insists that the ice game be "cleared up" pronto if the United States is to be represented by a hockey team in the 1940 Olympic games in Japan.

Rubien charges that "professional promoters have invaded this sport and so commercialized certain sections of it that it is a disgrace for their leagues and clubs to be operating under the banner of amateurism." Rubien declares that those "professional and semi-professional outfits" must be restrained from advertising themselves as "amateurs" and that college and club teams desiring to retain their amateur standing must refrain from scheduling games with "pros."

Popularity Amazing

Amateur hockey is a "duckling" because its popularity in northern United States is as recent as it is amazing. The A. A. U. took over organization of the sport in 1931 in order to provide a team to represent the United States at Lake Placid.

You can get a fair idea of the duckling's egg-laying ability when you realize that a record crowd of 14,247 paying fans attended Sunday afternoon's game at Madison Square Garden when the New York Rovers beat the Atlantic City Sea Gulls. There was nothing particular at stake in the game just a tilt between two clubs of the Eastern Amateur Hockey League.

The other three clubs in the league are the Hershey, Pa. Bears; the Baltimore Orioles—I understand that the fans swarm out in those cities also—and the Bronx, N. Y. Tigers. Likewise in cities belonging to the Michigan-Ontario circuit. The promoters realize that there's plenty of gold in the duckling's eggs.

Rubien emphasizes another "commercializing" angle to these big-time hockey circuits. He says the promoters of professional hockey have come to realize their value as "farm clubs" for producing performers who may graduate later to clubs in the National Professional Hockey League. He says Cleveland's big problem is to get the maximum out of the material at hand and the acquisition of Oscar Vitt as manager may quite possibly convert the Indians into a hustling heads-up club. The Indians have potentially the finest pitching staff in baseball, and with Feller, Allen Harder, and Galehouse hitting on all cylinders will give the Yanks something to worry about.

Bucks, Cards Strengthen

The owners of the National League champions to see eye to eye with Ruppert about running a ball club if the efforts to strengthen the Indians since their world series debacle may be taken as a guide. They've spent more time and effort trying to build up their Jersey City Farm club than they have the Giant club itself. President Bill Benswanger estimates the Indians have spent \$75,000 in cash and \$25,000 in players to bring in Minor league talent, including Ruppert, Catcher Berres, and Pitchers Sewell, Duke and Klinger. The Indians have brought up several of their prime Minor league stars, including Outfielder Slaughter and Third Baseman Garibaldi.

Of the other National league
