

Going Into Business

The "off-the-street-clubs" started about a year and a half ago are, in effect, going into business, so that money may be obtained to provide the young men with clothing, school supplies, and the like—things they could not obtain otherwise. Briefly, Mr. Parroni plans a little

carpenter club, in which the young men will repair broken down furniture, make toys, and in general learn a trade that may be useful to them later. Mr. Parroni is very happy about

the whole thing, and once he gets started talking about it, his listeners usually pick up some of his enthu-

Anyone who has some furniture

that is forgotten but still needs repairing will find an enthusiastic promoter in Mr. Parroni. His boys, he said, will be eager to go to the places, pick up the work, do it right, Tinder the advice and tutelage of

Roy Gyle, a carpenter, and member of the parish, the boys will work at odd carpentry jobs in a shop to be constructed in the church basement. Two Classes At Start There will be two classes of about 15 each at the start, and later, there

will be another class. Regular shop machinery will be obtained. Persons both inside and outside the parish have contributed to a fund to buy the necessary equipment, but if the plan is to succeed more money is needed.
