Mr. Parroni plans a little carpenter club, in which the young men will repair broken down furniture, make toys, and in general learn a trade that may be useful to them later. Mr. Parroni is very happy about the whole thing, and once he gets started talking about it, his listeners usually pick up some of his enthusiasm.
