



1. Here our artist shows us six periods in the story of the antiers of a European stag. Having lost his horns of the year before, the stag sprouts two "knobs" in the spring. In about a month, they start branching out. Later they lose their velvety, hairy covering, and the points get to be sharp, as in figures "5" and "6".



2. By late summer, the stag is well fitted to defend the does and fawns with his antlers, also with the hofs of his forefeet. Wolves sometimes attack deer, but they choose a fawn or a doe as their victims. The stag is not afraid of them, and rather than let harm come to his family, he rushes at the enemy.



3. Among the large North American deer is the wapitl. It is related to the European red deer, but is larger, Sometimes the wapiti is called "the American elk." Big, wide-spreading horns of interesting shape are grown by the moose. In most branches of the deer family, only the males have antiers, but the reindeer doe has them.


