Meteorologist Goes on the Air

Eric R. Miller, chief of the U.S. weather bureau on the University of Wisconsin campus, now has a microphone on his desk and twice each day broadcasts messages about the weather over WHA.

Each morning at 9:50, as soon as the national reports have been recorded and mapped, Miller gives a complete picture of the weather cross the nation. He reports conditions likely to bring about changes in the weather and gives the day's forecast. Again in the afternoon he summarizes later reports and gives the forecast for

the next day.

Miller was the pioneer radio radio weather broadcaster. Letters in his files from the Washington headquarters indicate that the Madison bureau was the first in this country to broadcast telephoneather reports. These went out in 1920 over 9XM, which later grew into WHA.

Mr. Ennis moved into the leadoff spot with a weighty tome which he shipped up here airmail all the way from El Paso, Tex. His dissertation - concerning the activities of professional tennis players Ellsworth Vines and Fred Perrywas so weighted down with ponderous phrases and six-bit words, that I am surprised the postal authorities accepted it as airmail matter. It should have been sent freight.

In brief, Mr. Ennis reports that on the present tour Perry and vines have played 13 matches through Feb. 3, that Vines holds the edge by a count of eight to five, and that they will play 75 matches in the next few months. That Perry is burned up because Vines is billed as "professional champion" when everyone knows that they each won 37 matches or their tour last year. 
