Short Wave Notes: The entire world is right in the short-wave listener's own backyard. At least it has been recently, for conditions have been such that stations in Europe, Asia, Africa, North America, South America, and Australia have been heard consistently and with good volume by those who have listened for them. Of course, reception from Europe is not considered unusual any longer. It is an exceptionally bad night when at least half a dozen European stations cannot be heard. England, Germany, France, Holland, Italy, Spain, Portugal, Switzerland and sometimes Poland and Czechoslovakia are on the short-waver listener's bill of fare almost any night. From Asia, probably the best heard and most consistently received station is JZJ at 11.80 megacycles and located at Tokyo, Japan. This station may be heard well almost any afternoon from 3:30 to 4:30 with programs of typically oriental character. By far the best African short-waver is ZTJ at Johannesburg, South Africa. Utilizing a power of 30,000 watts, this station has been coming through with fine strength and clarity. Located at 9.61 megacycles, it is easily heard from the time it comes on the air at 10:45 p. m. until its sign off at 11:30 p. m. Of course, there are a dozen or more North American shortwave stations from which to choose. Old-timers at shortwave listening have discovered that many times when reception conditions on the regular broadcasting band are so poor as to make distant reception of network programs impossible, perfect reception can be obtained by dropping to the shortwave bands.

Labor League to Act in Fall Voting

WASHINGTON (U.P.)—Labor's Non-Partisan League, disclosing that it is analyzing voting records of congressmen on a dozen major issues affecting workers and farmers, said today it soon will announce whom it will support in the fall elections. The wages and hours vote in both houses is the major basis on which support of the League will be granted or denied. Officials said it was extremely unlikely that any house member who voted to recommit that measure to committee would be given League support this fall.

Our analysis of these votes is being prepared for distribution in every congressional and senatorial district, an official said. "The record on these issues virtually will determine whom we will support. For this reason, in some districts we probably will be supporting democrats. In others, we will back republicans. Where neither old party candidate is acceptable, we may put up independents."

The strength of Labor's Non-Partisan League is not known. It was organized in 1936 with backing of both the committee for industrial organization and some American Federation of Labor leaders to reelect President Roosevelt. Recently, President William Green and the Federation executive council directed AFL unions to withdraw from the League, but League officials asserted there has been no perceptible loss of strength as a result. They claim most of their state organizations are headed by AFL members despite

Wigonitzes, Partners 25 Years, Go Own Ways

The long partnership of two Madison brothers who started working together since they landed as immigrants 25 years ago was recalled today, after the announcement that Herman L. Wigonitz and Louis H. Wigonitz had dissolved their partnership in the Campus Soda Grill. Herman will have sole ownership of the grill, well known to University of Wisconsin students, while Louis will devote his time to his job as state distributor for office and building intercommunication systems. Both men had their first jobs in Madison with The Wisconsin State Journal as newsboys, and became well known for their "honor" system of selling newspapers. That way, the customer helped himself, but also left the necessary change—often, the boys found, leaving a little extra. With proceeds from the papers, they bought a car, enlarged their business, and then in 1922 opened the grill on State st., later enlarging it. Famous university athletes worked at the grill, Louis remembered, but perhaps what stood out more in his mind was the time students nearly burned the place during prohibition. Someone brought a can of "alky" into the grill, and then, after snacking out drinks from the can, set it on fire. The boys had to use soft drinks to quench the "firewater."

John Marty, Sr., One of Green's Oldest, Dies

MONROE—John Marty, Sr., 95, of Mt. Pleasant township, one of the oldest residents of Green county and one of its earliest cheesemakers, died at his home Wednesday after an illness of several months. Mr. Marty was born in Switzerland, the son of John and Marie Marty. He came to Mt. Pleasant township at the age of 19 and lived there ever since. His work as a cheesemaker dates back to 1868. On Oct. 10, 1878, he married Anna Babler. She is now 82. He was a member of the German Reformed church, Monticello. Surviving, besides the widow, are six sons, Matt, Jacob H., and Henry M. Marty, Monticello; Adam, of Monroe; John, of Janesville, and Herman, Los Angeles; two daughters, Marie, at home, and Mrs. Christ Balsiger, Juda; a brother, Adam, Switzerland; and a sister, Mrs. Adam Marty, Council Bluffs, Ia. Funeral services will be held Saturday at Mr. Marty's home and at 2 p. m. in the German Reformed church, Monticello, with the Rev. A. Muehleimer officiating.
