Helen Wills Moody to Try Comeback Without Dramatics

Y.—(INS)—Three years ago, Helen Wills Moody, easily the most dramatic figure in women's lawn tennis, suddenly decided to play a comeback in the Wimbledon championships and, probably unconsciously, produced an almost romantic episode with her "die hard" last set win over Helen Jacobs in the final round.

Today, I'm able to state for the first time that Mrs. Moody means, hopes and intends to repeat the performance, this time without the dramatics.

In other words, she plans to play in the Wimbledon all-comers singles of 1938, pass up the American singles at Forest Hills and, all told, have the time of her young life. The latter statement is to be taken literally.

That's hardly in keeping with the little lady of the impassive poker expression and the so called "killer" instinct we all loved to prate about a few years ago.

We, as a matter of fact, always made a point of Mrs. Moody's "coldness" on the courts and probably we'd still be at it today, not recognizing meantime that the lady has undergone quite a conspicuous change.
