"This is to be simply a story adaptation with music," the composer said. "I composed the music and wrote the story, in English, side by side. I believe that opera should be a marriage of words and music."

Menotti has adopted a special echnique for his radio opera. Action in any one place is never longer than five minutes. To indicate these rapid changes he will use a narrator, whose sole function will be to announce the shift. He will say, "Now we are at the market," or "here we are in the street."-only that, no more.


