

Connie Mack Believes He Has Another Championship Team in the Making

By GEORGE KIRKSEY [United Press Staff Correspondent] LAKE CHARLES, La.—(U.P.) It took Connie Mack two years to build his championship team of 1905. Only one year was required field, Wally Moses. to put together his great pennant winners of 1910-11-13-14. Four years were needed to construct his formidable champions of 1929-30-

Now at 75, he's laying the foun-dation for what he hopes will grow into another world championship outfit. How long will it take him? Will his health hold up long enough for him to pilot the Philadelphia Athletics back to the pinnacle of the American league after (our bleak years in the second division?"

The kindly, patient old gentleman who handles his players as if they were his sons believes he has the talent to form the backbone of another all-conquering team.

Not Ready as Yet

"They're not ready yet," says Mack. "We still have our prob-lems but there's much about this eam to give me encouragement. I'm especially enthusiastic about my pitching staff. 




