Short Wave Notes

Station VUB at Delhi, India, on 9.59 megacycles, is being heard in various sections of the east and middle-west around 8:30 daily. This station, long listed in log books and long listened for by the short wave fan, is apparently coming in fairly regularly for the first time in its existence. The signal is said to fade out rapidly after 9:30. Listeners who have picked up this Indian station say that it comes on the air at 8:30 with eight chimes of a clock and that the announcer speaks English only

Announcements from VP2LO on the island of St. Kitts in the British East Indies gives it shortwave broadcasting schedule as from 3 to 3:45 p. m. daily and from 9 to 9:45 a. m. on Sundays. However, programs from this station have been heard between 7 and 8 p. m. The frequency used is 6.38 megacycles.

A new Caribbean station has been picked up recently. Its call letters are not known but its location is at Fort de France in Martinique. Its exact frequency is not known, either, but it is always heard between 9:30 and 9:35 megacycles. It was picked up beween 6 and 7 p. m.

Czechoslovakia has increased its broadcasting schedule for the United States. On 9.55 megacycles, the Czech station broadcasts from to 9 p. m. after which it shifts to 11.76 or 11.84 megacycles. It is now being heard daily except Wednesdays and Saturdays,


