Hanson, Isaacson Lead in City Attorney Race

The fight for the office of city attorney lies between Harold Hanson, assistant U. S. district attorney and a former Stoughton city attorney, and Leon Isaacson, associated with Atty. H. H. Thomas, it became evident Friday night in the common council meeting when Ald. George E. Gill, council president, sought to fix a date for a caucus.

Hanson stood first on the eligible list submitted to the council several weeks ago by the board of personnel and Isaacson ranked third. Gerald Maloney, a brother of Ald. Norris E. Maloney, stood second.

Gill announced that Ald. E. Halsey Kraege will not be able to attend a caucus April 18, the night before the reorganization council session. He said in his opinion every member should be present for the caucus.

It became known during the meeting that an attempt is being made to place Isaacson in office, although Hanson also has a strong following. Aldermen supporting Hanson maintain that if civil service means anything, the man standing highest should be selected.

"Why hold a caucus?" Kraege asked. "I am willing to vote on the floor of the council."

When Gill suggested that a caucus be held on the afternoon of Easter Sunday, Ald. George H. Armbricht rebelled. "Nothing doing," he shouted.

A suggestion was then made that the caucus be held next Saturday but Ald. George A. Isberner said he could not leave his business. Aldermen were inclined to respect Holy Week and also turned thumbs down on the suggestion that the caucus take place Good Friday. It was impossible to agree upon a date. Ald. Maloney finally offered a suggestion to solve the difficulty.

"We have waited with the election of a city attorney for three months, so why not wait three more days and elect one at the regular meeting, April 22?" he asked.

The council then voted to hold the caucus Thursday, April 21. Doris E. Lehner will continue to act as city attorney until April 22. After the place has been filled she will resume her duties as assistant city attorney. She has been acting since the resignation of Francis Lamb which took effect Feb. 1.

Mayor Law will submit his appointments of committees and members of boards and commissions at the organization meeting April 19 but all selections to be made by the council will be deferred until April 22.

The council adjourned until Tuesday, April 19, at 11 a. m. to wind up its business. At noon the new council will be called to order by Mayor Law.
