

Immell, After 32 years in Madison as head of the Wisconsin Library school, Mary Imogene Hazeltine will leave at the end of the present university year to make her future home in New York.

In Jamestown, a city of 50,000 at the foot of Chautauqua lake, Miss Hazeltine upon her zetirement will take over the home of a brother and his wife who are now living in Florida. She was born in Jamestown, as was her father before her, and her grandfather was one of the first settlers of the community when it was established in 1815.

She came to Madison in 1906, to become the first principal of the library school at the call of Dr. Ruben G. Thwaites as chairman of the state library commission. She had been librarian of the Jamestown public library after graduating from Jamestown high school and Wellesley college.

"I'm exceedingly sorry to leave my connections in Madison," Miss Hazeltine said Saturday. "I have enjoyed every minute here and it has been a completely interesting and worthwhile experience."

In her 32 years here the library school has turned out 1.089 graduates who are scattered in positions over the entire United States and in eight foreign countries.

Outstanding products of the school include Miss Althea Warren, librarian of the Los Angeles public library; Mrs. Mary Watkins Dietrichson, head of the Kirstein business branch of the Boston public library, the only business branch library occupying a building of its own; Miss Esther Johnston, head of the circulation department in the New York pub-
