# Chicago Scans Luxury Tax for Relief

CHICAGO- (U.R) -Chicago today considered taxing cigarettes, soft drinks, gasoline and checks to raise relief money.

With relief funds practically exhausted, the city council ponder-ed proposals that it apply for special enabling legislation to raise money for continuation of its \$29,-000,000 relief load..

Two major proposals under consideration were:

1-One per cent municipal sales tax on soft drinks, cigarettes, gasoline and checks. 2—Diversion of one and a half cents instead of one cent from the state three per cent sales tax.

·Councilmen believed the "luxury" tax would add \$8,000,000 to the \$14,800,000 the city receives for relief costs and that the second proposal would raiset the remaining \$7,000,000. Mayor Edward-J. Kelly's advisory committee sent the proposals to the coun-

City officials said relief funds will be exhausted by May 1 or shortly thereafter.






