Game Saturday

EVANSTON, Ill.—Spring football practice will wind up at Northwestern university Saturday with the annual preview game between two picked squads. Nearly 100 players, the largest turnout in recent years, will participate in the game. Coach Lynn Waldorf has been well pleased with the progress made during the six weeks drill. On the strength of the showing this spring he feels that the Wildcats will have a faster, more experienced eleven next fall. Much attention was paid this spring to developing players to replace Don Ikep, left half, and Fred Vanzo, blocking quarterback, both of whom graduated in June. Freshmen predominated in the competition for these positions. Three other regulars from last year's team also will be lost at diploma time. They are John Kovatch, end; Mike Calvano, guard, and Erwin Wegner, center. Filling their positions does not offer as hard a problem as the backfield vacancies since returning lettermen are expected to take over in each case. Most of the players who will participate in the intra-squad game will be freshmen. Only 11 of the 20 lettermen who return to the fall will be in the game, the other nine being out for baseball and track. The 11 veterans will be divided among the two teams. The only backfield lettermen out this spring are George McGurk and Jay Laskay, fullbacks. Jack Ryan who is expected to move into Heep's job at left half next fall is on the baseball team as is Nick Contes who was Vanzo's understudy last fall. Bernard Jefferson, veteran right half, was unable to play this spring because of a foot injury. Several freshman backs attracted the attention of the coaches this spring. Among the most promising are Paul Soper of Muskegon, Michigan; Erwin Madsen, Chicago; Oliver Hahnstein, Aurora, Illinois; Dick Richards, Sioux Falls, S. D.; Ashley Arnold, Kalamazoo, Michigan; Albert Butcher, Maryville, Mo., and John Brown of Hillsdale, N. J. Fresh Linemen Promising Francis Purtell of Milwaukee and Vic Theiling of St. Louis are two yearling fullbacks who hold a good showing this spring. Harold Junkunc, rugged freshman from Oak Park, is expected to make a strong bid for Vanzo's old job at quarterback. The presence of eight lettermen made the going tougher for the freshman linemen this spring. Veterans on hand included John Human, center; Frank Young, tackle; Don Guritz, Dick Wells, Hal Method and Fred Heitman, guards; and Bob Daly and Tom Eby, ends. In spite of this array of experienced forwards, some of the yearling linemen stood out. James Smith, rangy Negro end from Aurora, is expected to push the veterans for a regular job. Corne Aarts, 190 pound Oak Park boy, appears to be the cream of the freshman tackle aspirants. Standout guards among the newcomers are Art Niedbalski of South Bend and Joe Lokanc of East Chicago. Paul Hieman of Buffalo is a promising center.

Hoveland, Connor Get 1,352 Pins in Men's City Meet

Julius Hoveland and Versus Connor provided the thrills in the annual city bowling tournament at the Plaza alleys Wednesday by rolling 1,352 for second place in the doubles. The runners-up, newcomers in the ten pin sport, were allotted a handicap of 324 and each succeeded in bettering 500. Hoveland strung up games of 153, 205, 155 for 523 and Connor rapped out 505 on 182, 136 and 187. Bob Muchow and Al Radl went into a triple tie for sixth when they battered the maples for a gross 1,288. Radl procured 624 on 227, 221 and 176, while Muchow contributed 559. They were spotted 105 pins. Scores in the singles department were lopsided, but none could find a position among the top ten leaders. Percy Kanvik was just outside with 684 on 221, 202 and 213.
