After the Meiklejohn children had outgrown playing with it and had moved to Madison, it was given to the children of the Prof, and Mrs. Paul Clark, 2136 Van Hise avenue, who played with it for several years. Then the E. B. Gordon family (Pro-fessor and Mrs. and their children) fell heir to it and formed a family theatrical troup which gave delightful plays for their friends in it for many season. The musical Gordons even organized a small inter-family orchestra

to furnish music for over-ure and intermissions. About the time the Gordon's brood began to scatter, the 14-year-old at our house (then the 8-year-old) became tremendously interested in marrionettes and the Gordons passed the theater on to her. She and her little friends, including Helen Bewick and the Nelson twins, Nernie and Ginnie, dramatized, knotted and unknotted control strings, and had a swell time with it for two years . . . until we moved out of that house and into an apartment so tiny we


