For more than a century, betting on running horses has probably been the biggest daily gamble in American sports. I mean the wagering on horses that gallop under a jockey-horses that take their natural stride to gain speed.

The men who reared and raced these running thoroughbreds persistently soft-pedalled the wagering angle while they stressed the improvement of the breed," even while the rest of the world was speeding up amazingly with machinery, automobiles, airplanes and motorboats.

We haven't heard much of this 'improvement' from the harness men who never provided much cause for nation-wide wagering and consequently little cause for nation-wide defense. Yet, these conservative chaps who attach chariots, come out now with figures to prove that they are improving the breed faster than the

running-hoss guys. Alden Calkins, press agent for the trotting horse club of America, has compiled figures to show that trotting marks for the standard nile has dropped 1234 seconds during the past 50 years, whereas run-ning horse records were pared only 5¼ seconds during that half cen-

It seems that 50 years ago, Maud S. established the world record for trotters at 2:08% for the mile. Expert horsemen whon witnessed that performance said, "by gosh, it'll never be beaten." They were wrong. Today Greyhound holds the mark at 1:56, which is 12% seconds faster.

Meanwhile what have the running horses done? Calkins discovers that the mark for the mile was 1:39% a half century ago. He emphasizes that while Ten Broeck held this figure in 1888, Ten Broeck actually established it 11 years before-in 1877. Today, 61 years later, Equipoise holds the mile record for a running horse at 1:34 2-5, a drop of only 51/4 seconds as compared with the 1234 for trotting horses in 50 years.

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
