POPE PIUS XI

CASTEL GANDOLFO -(INS)—Hundreds of congratulatory telegrams flowed in on Pope Pius today as the pontiff celebrated his 81st birthday anniversary, becoming the seventeenth of history's 261 popes to live beyond 80.

The pope's close associates said he was generally in better health than a year ago although he suffers increasingly from asthma and insomnia. The pontiff spent most of the morning receiving his us-

ual official callers and reading many of the messages sent to him.

Pope Pius was born Achille Ratti at Milan on May 31, 1857.

The German ambassador to the Holy See was one of the many diplomats sending congratulations to the pope. Premier Mussolini sent his tribute in the form of a squadron of nine military planes which flew in formation over the papal villa.

Appearing briefly on the balcony of his home, the pontiff said:

This is a beautiful day. It is pleasant to have a birthday under such auspices.'




