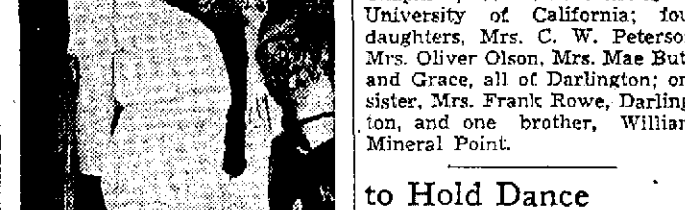

Minnesota Car Crash Kills Sparta Women

SPARTA—Two Sparta women were dead today as a result of a two-car auto collision near Fairmont Minn., Friday in which seven other persons were hurt. Mrs. Lorena Hay, Sparta, was killed instantly. Mrs. Herbert Hanson, 31, Sparta, died in a hospital several hours after the accident.



Others hurt were Mrs. Inez Schaitel, 39, driver of the Wisconsin car containing six persons; Mrs. Florence Heppler, 60, both suffering bruises and shock; Lloyd Peterson, Sparta, chest injuries and bruises; Alred E. Hackney, 63, Tomah, knocked unconscious from a bump on the head; and in the other car, enroute to Vancouver, B. C., George Campbell, 31, Chicago, driver, broken ankle bone, cuts and bruises; Nancy Campbell, Chicago, cut on head, and John Karall, Vancouver, cuts and bruises.
