Shoe on the Other Foot-- It Pinches

By GEORGE KIRKSEY (United Press Staff Correspondent) NEW YORK, N. Y. (U.P.)—The shoe that National league wore so long is now on the foot of the American league and it pinches.

Even Friday when the two major leagues went back into action in their own provinces, there were still echoes from the All-Star game at Cincinnati Wednesday. And the echoes were loud and will last for some time.

The National league previously beaten four out of five times in the all-star game, took considerable undesired abuse during that period. Magazine stories that called a spade a spade and didn't furnish any soothing balm for open wounds helped to fan the flame which resulted in the National league's victory at Cincinnati.

The American leaguers probably believed what the magazines said, that the National league was "a minor league." They prepared for the game that way. Trosky, Cleveland first baseman, and second leading hitter in the American league, was ignored. And as the game turned out one of the vital plays in Cincinnati was a blind-bunt by first baseman Lou Gehrig.

Hank Greenberg, Detroit first baseman who is among the leaders in runs batted in, refused to go to the game because he felt he didn't have a chance to play. The American league could have well used him.

The play which clinched the game for the National league came in the seventh inning with the senior circuit leading, 2-0. Frank McCormick was on first after a single and Leo Durocher laid down a bunt. Jimmy Foxx, shifted from first to third, fielded the ball perfectly but there was no one to throw to at first. Gehrig had waited at his position for a possible hit and run play. Gehrig had rushed in to cover a bunt down the first base line.

Foxx held the ball until he saw Gehrig racing for the bag. Then he let fly with a perfect throw but Gehrig didn't get there in time. So the records reveal Gehrig racing as a goat. That's far from the actual facts. It happens that Gehrig was the goat. He rushed in to cover a bunt and then failed to get back to first when the bunt went down the third base line. New York writers have tried to make a goat out of Gehrig, calling him the "perfect player who failed."

It's a Major League As a matter of fact Gehrig was farther away from first than Gehrig when he tried to get to the bag. But he tried. Gehrig stood flat-footed before he turned and made an attempt to cover. There were Trosky and Greenberg, two first class first basemen. Trosky was left off the team for some unknown reason, and Greenberg, believing he had no chance to play, preferred not to sit on the bench.

Trosky has openly criticized the American league for leaving him off the team. It's doubtful if he'll ever accept an invitation to play because he can't get much better than he is now and if he isn't good enough in 1938 there may never come a time when he's any better.

Shifting Foxx to third seemed like a strange move in view of the fact that Manager Joe McCarthy had Red Rolfe, his own third baseman available. But he ignored Rolfe, who was a star in last year's all-star game at Washington, in order to keep Foxx in the lineup.

From now on the American league will have to take the All-Star game seriously because there's no chance of backing out of the game now. Most of the American league magnates wanted to abandon it before the Cincinnati game, feeling that the National league really was inferior. But after the American league's exhibition there, there is reason to believe that the National league is really a major league too.

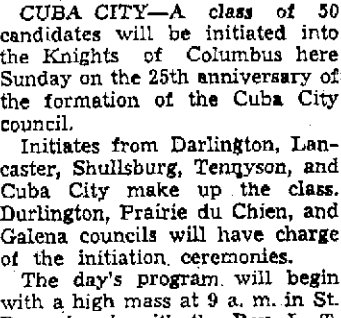
