

NBC Symphony Has Brilliant Debut

A significant development in American radio and an outstandingly brilliant achievement in the realm of musicboth are recorded in a review of the NBC Symphony orchestra's first season, brought to a close by its 33rd Saturday night broadcast on June 25.

Under the illustrious Arturo Toscanini and the nine guest conductors who shared the podium with him, this "first full-size, full-time symphony orchestra to be established by and for radio in the United States," during its first season, established several new precedents and shattered several old traditions.

Of the 33 Saturday night broadcasts, which began Nov. 13, 1937, Arturo Toscanini conducted 11, Arthur Rodzinski directed seven, plus the "dress rehearsal," broadcast on Nov. 2, 1937. Pierre Monteaux conducted five, Carlos Chavez two, Howard Hanson one, Hugh Ross one, Sir Adrian Boult two, Dimitri Mitropou-les one, Bernardino Molinari three, and Hans Steinberg one. Thus, during its first sea-son the NBC Symphony orchestra played and won acclaim under 10 different conductors—a severe test for even an old, welt-established orchestra. Isadore Freed also appeared on the podium, conducting one of his own compositions during a Monteux program. Of these conductors, two were American, two Italian, two English, one Polish, one French, one Mexican, one Greek, and one German.

In addition the NEC Symorchestra presented three benefit programs in Carnegie hall, two under the direction of Toscanini and one under Rodzinski.

Thirty-three complete symphonies were broadcast. Seventeen symphonic poems, 34 overtures, seven works in the concerto grosso form, 16 complete suites, three suites in part, three major choral works were performed. Altogether 76 different composers were presented.

The world premieres of three American works were included: Dr. Howard Han-son's "Symphony Number 3 in D Major"; the symphonic poem, "The Last Knight," by Hilda Emery Davis, and Emerson, Withorne's "Sierra Morena," opus 59. Two works were given their American premieres: Shostakovich's

"Fifth Symphony" and Aaron Copland's "El Salon Mexico." The NBC Symphony orchestra's 33 Saturday night broadcasts were heard throughout the United States over the facilities of the National Broadcasting co.

Music Clinic Enrolls 600

With a total enrolment of more than 500 high school student musicians and directors of music from all parts of Wisconsin and the middlewest expected, the ninth annual music clinic of the University of Wisconsin will get under way today and Monday.

Sponsored annually by the school of music, the clinic gives music directors and student musicians of high schools an opportunity for three weeks of intensive music study under some of the country's foremost music teachers. The clinic will come to a close with a concert Saturday, July 30.

High school student musicians who enroll in the clinic bers of either the All-State band, orchestra, or chorus, each of which will give several concerts during the period, according to Prof. Orien E. Dalley, of the school of music faculty, director of the clinic. An opera will also be produced by a picked group of students, to be chosen at try-outs in the Music annex today.


