Benchley, the New York drama critic, humorist, and more lately picture actor, is one of Metro's finest investments. He writes all his own pictures personally in a single day. Then he comes to the studio. which has a set ready for him, and says his lines while the cameras grind. At the end of the day the technicians invariably have an hilarious one-reel comedy, featuring Benchley in serious trouble.

This is necessary because before your picture can become eligible for entry in The National Awards the written domain of such person or persons to the use of the picture for advertising purposes must be obtained. Following are the classifications in which prizes will be awarded weekly and at the end of the contest:

CLASS A. Children and Babies: Any picture in which the principal interest is a child or children.

CLASS B. Sports, Hobbies, Recreations, Avocations, Vocations, Action Pictures, Animals, Pets: Baseball, golf, tennis, motor boating, canceling, salling, beach sports, airplanes, fishing, animal pictures, peis, gardening, forming, etc.

CLASS C. Scenes and Suil Life Studies; Landscapen, marine views, city streets, travel or country scenes, architecture, interiors, "still life," pictures of art objects, curios, cut flowers, fruit, etc.

CLASS D. Informal Portraits of Adults: Pictures of one or more persons (close up or full figure) in natural and apparently unpoxed attitude: character studies; genre (flustrative of common life), and pictures in which charm and personality of the subject are outstanding.
