Three 'Topnotchers' Featured Attractions on Airwaves Tonight



Lovers of fine symphonic music have a well planned night ahead of them when they tune in on three "topnotchers" tonight.

A broadcast of the opening of this country's most outstanding summer music festival will be heard tonight when the Boston Symphony orchestra inaugurates its fifth annual Berkshire festival over station WLS at 6:30.

The Toronto Promenade Symphony orchestra will present another weekly concert with Dr. Frank Simon, director of the Cincinnati Conservatory of Music, as guest conductor, and Alberto Guerrero, pianist, as soloist. Station WIBA is the outlet at 7 p. m.

The Windy city's Grant Park concert tonight is headed by John Carter, tenor, and Jerzy Bojanowski's orchestra. The concert will be broadcast through several stations starting at 7:30 p. m. over WMAQ.

Burdick Is Victor in Two Class C Sailboat Races

Oconomowoc, Wis. — (UP) — The annual Inland Lakes Yachting Association's class C invitational regatta entered its second day here today with Irv Burdick of Milwaukee holding victories in the first two races. Madison's entries failed to finish among the leaders in either race.

Burdick piloted his Snit II, of Pewaukee Lake, through the high waves which ruffled Oconomowoc Lake during the racing Wednesday. His craft covered the course in one hour, 12 minutes and 37 seconds in the first race.

In the second race, he traveled the six-mile course in 59 minutes, 36 seconds to defeat William Simon, Jr., of Chicago who piloted Tenie II of Cedar Lake over the course in one hour.

Trailing Burdick in the first race was C. B. Goes of Delavan, Wis., sailing Pike VII to the finish line eight seconds behind the Snit. Third place went to Bud Sprinkman of Milwaukee, sailing Suzanne of Cedar Lake. Jacob Nunnenmacher, Milwaukee, piloting Wildcat II of Pine Lake, was fourth.

Nine of the 83 starters in the first race capsized as a strong south westerly wind whipped white caps on Oconomowoc Lake.

In the second race, Larry Goldberg of Chicago sailed his Gilmont II of Cedar Lake, the first boat to be disabled in the initial race, into third position.

Goes' Pike VII came in fourth, followed by R. Mackay Lynch of Chicago, sailing the Pine Lake entry, As-Ma-Baby.
