From the Press Box

NEW YORK—Along about in the middle of a world series some such rollicking dispatch as this used to come singing over the wires from Pittsburgh: "Jock Sutherland's mighty Panthers won the season's lid-lifter today from the Upsidedown Teachers, 161 to 0." Whereupon the boys in the press box would yawn, make some crack about Pitt being not as tough as usual this year, and go back to writing about Babe Ruth. If a group of earnest young men chose to die for dear old Upsidedown Teachers in that violent fashion, it was no concern of the scribes. For dying in that opening game against Pitt, or Minnesota, or Alabama had become a time-honored custom. Football went on for years without changing the pattern of its traditional schedule. The first game for the big teams was a "breather". But the days of late September and early October touch-down parades are going the way of the cigar store Indian. Nowadays the world series is hardly dry on the sports pages before the big guns of college football start blowing one another to bits. A glance at the nation's football schedules shows about 50 cur-lain raisers this year in which equine meet. Minnesota takes on Washington, Southern California meets Alabama, California meets St. Mary's, Cornell play Colgate, Columbia engages Yale. Such games, played within the first two weeks of the grid year, would have been heresy five or six years ago. Coach Jock Sutherland, whose Pitt team ventures into the field for an opener with West Virginia, usually a tough foe, observes that the streamlined schedule has found enthusiastic welcome from a football public whose emotions must be let out in two short months. And that baseball can show warning. The world series show had better be good! Add to the above names those of Stanford, Texas, Purdue, Iowa, U. C. L. A., Detroit, West Virginia, Michigan, Wisconsin, Ohio, Indiana, Northwestern, Kansas, Notre Dame, Kansas State, Pennsylvania, Harvard, Lafayette, Brown, St. Mary's, Texas Christian, Centenary, Rice, Oklahoma, Missouri, Nebraska, Washington, Washington State, Mississippi, Louisiana State, Oregon and Marquette.

Baha'i Tenets Explained in Radio Talk

A religion which advocates a "world state" similar to that often described by historian H. G. Wells, was outlined Tuesday night in a radio talk by Marguerite Reimer, national traveling representative of the Baha'i movement. "The principles of the Baha'i faith, she explained, were originated in Persia about 90 years ago. Among the tenets of the religion, she said, are ones asserting that religion and science are compatible. "There are also principles of doing away with extremes of wealth and poverty, the ideal of universal education, and the modern world's first social instruction concerning the equality of sexes." Quoting the words of Shoghi Effendi, present leader of the movement, she explained the "world state."

"This commonwealth must consist of a world legislature, whose members will as trustees control the resources and adjust the relationships of all peoples. "A world executive, backed by an international force, will carry out the decisions of this world legislature and will safeguard the unity of the commonwealth. "A world tribunal will deliver the final verdict in all disputes. "A world metropolis will act as the center of civilization. "A world language will either be invented or chosen and will be taught in the schools in addition to the native tongue. "A world script will simplify intercourse. "The economic resources of the world will be organized. National rivalries will cease, and racial prejudice will be replaced by amity. "The religion, it was explained, has no ritual and has only one temple. The members usually meet in private homes for "irreside talks." There are no paid clergy.

Barbara A Cowgirl? Perhaps!

By MILTON HARKER (Continued) HOLLYWOOD—(INS)—Barbara Stanwyck's great ambition is to play a cowgirl or some other rugged outdoor character on the screen. "I don't know why, but maybe it's just because I've done about everything else," she confided to this reporter today. "A good deal of time of late they've had me all dressed up and I'm a little weary of it."

Barbara, incidentally, wore her most expensive wardrobe of all, in "The Mad Miss Manton," which she completed at RKO last week. "The kind of a character I mean is like Jean Arthur played in 'The Plainsman,'" she explained. "There are so many good women western characters who would be equally good on the screen. The only really outdoor picture I've played in years is 'Annie Oakley,'" but that was primarily a circus picture. "I remember when I played Annie, a couple of police marksmen took me down to their target range at the studio's instigation to teach me how to handle a gun. I hit the target the first shot—probably beginner's luck—and

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never once after that." For the first time Barbara explained why she rejected pictures during the past year at RKO and 20th Century Fox, causing her suspension for a time by both studios. "About the only way I can put it to be really understandable is to say that I like to play characters who have some guts. I won't play 'wishy-washy' characters. That was what I was supposed to play in both the pictures I turned down. "I couldn't do a good job in those kind of parts and it would be unfair of me to the public to play them. You want to remember that when I turned them down I was the main loser. I didn't get paid."
