Nazi Breaks Yankee Swimming Streak

STUTTGART, Germany American supremacy in free-style sprint swimming was broken today for the first time since Uncle Sam's aquatic stars began their present European tour. Werner Plath of Germany finally won a sprint race for Europe Tuesday in an American-German




