Persons who talk, giggle, or both during programs of the summer concerts in the Mil-waukee county park, annoy C. F. Schmidt, Milwaukee music lover, and he has started a fund to rid the concerts of such irritants.

He sent a \$5 check to the county park commission with the following note:

"I can not believe that the offenders are deliberately try-ing to spoil the program for those around them, though they might as well be, as far as the effect is concerned. Instead, I believe the majority are merely thoughtless, absent-minded people who can not refrain from emitting sounds from their mouths merely because it is not other-wise occupied.
