To Charles Goldamer, Abbots-ford, president of the Wisconsin Farm Holiday assn. and vice chairman of the progressive party state central committee, Peterson paid \$300 for "speakers expenses". He paid another \$300 to E. J. Laufenberger, another former progressive, for the same purpose.

Goldamer and Laufenberger

have been tràveling with Peterson, speaking on his behalf. Goldamer recently had the holiday group repudiate the Farmer-Lapor-progressive federation with which it was formerly associated, and shift to the republican party and support of Peterson.

Expenditures totaling \$1,043.48 vere filed by the Wisconsin Sampfor-Senator club, Milwaukee, The club's statement showed it

owed a total of \$2,613, including a \$935 loan from the Milwaukee Loan co. The expenditures and bills were for newspaper advertisements, postage, stationery and other expenses incurred in its campaign to win the republican U.S. senatorial nomination for Edward J. Samp, Madison.

The Farmer-Labor-Progressive federation filed a statement showing \$812 contributed by various unions and individuals, \$655 spent and \$154.79 owing. Purpose of the contributions and expenditures were to support FLPF en-dorsed candidates, the statement said. The Edward F. Zunk-for-Con-

gress club, Milwaukee, reported \$1,015.60 received, and \$997.08 spent. Zunk, candidate for the fourth district seat, contributed \$400 of this fund. His personal statement showed \$552.61 spent, including the \$400 he contributed to the club sup-

porting him.
The Wiley-for-Senator club, Chippewa Falls, reported \$396 received in contributions while \$90 .-11 was spent in promoting the

candidacy of Alexander Wiley, Chippewa Falls republican. William H. Markham, Horicon, republican candidate for lieutenant governor, filed expenses of

\$265.70, and no contributions. Frank W. Smith, Oshkosh, union party candidate for governor, reported \$13.12 received, \$12.10 spent. Peter J. Glaudemans, Little Chute, union party candidate for congress from the eighth district, reported \$452 spent, with no contributions.


