They will be asked to present evidence covering their corporate and financial history and all phases of network opera tions, including relations with affiliates and each other and with advertisers, advertising agencies, and telephone and telegraph companies.

National networks requested to present evidence, in addition to the three major networks, include the Arrowhead network, Duluth, Minn., North Central Broadcasting systems, St. Paul, Minn., and Wisconsin Radio network, Fond du Lac, Wis.




