Badger Stars Out Mrs. Julius A. Page Jr. of Greensboro, N. C. the defending champion, was still in the picture following a 4 and 3 triumph over Mrs. Eric Phillips of Canada.

So, too, was Miss Dorothy Traung, co-medalist with Mrs. Page thanks to a brilliant rally that brought her from 4 down after four holes to a smashing 4 and 3 victory.
