Solly Krieger Will Not Defend Title for Six Months

NEW YORK (U.P.)—"With malice toward some..."

Solly Krieger, Brooklyn's battle-scarred middleweight man, will not defend his recently won middleweight crown for six months.

That's the ultimatum delivered by Manager Hymie Caplin to Promoter Mike Jacobs and all other fight entrepreneurs when Hymie and Solly stepped off the train from Seattle. It was at Seattle that Krieger registered the most brilliant and unexpected triumph of his nine-year career by wrestling the 167-pound tiara from young Al Hostak.

"Listen," said Manager Hymie. "They're a bunch of nirates in the fight game. You're a good fellow when you get somethin' the other guys want—and you give it to 'em. But after you ain't got what they want, you're just a louse with creditors and the sheriff barkin' at your worn out pants."

"Solly is my fourth champion. I had Al Singer, lightweight; Ben Jeby, middleweight; and Lou Salica, bantam. Solly ain't gonna do like they did. They lost their titles inside of three months. They wuz good fellahs. I wuz, a good fellah. I 'run 'em into the ring. But when they lose they didn't have no titles, and I didn't have no champions. They didn't make money. I didn't make money. We got the bird instead of bankrolls. I learned my lesson."

This pronouncement does not mean that beefy Krieger will loaf about his apartment reading the race results for six months. No, indeed, Hymie's ultimatum is merely the starting gun for the busiest period in Solly's nine-year career.

"I'm closin' today for a non-title fight between Solly and Billy Conn at Pittsburgh on Nov. 25," explained Pilot Hymie. "That's just the first of a flock of over-the-weight bouts in which we are goin' to pick up some cabbage without riskin' the championship. We'll probably fight for the Nate Lewis openin' the Chicago Stadium on Dec. 2. An' for the San Francisco Chronicle's Milk Fund show, Dec. 16. An' at Milwaukee on New Year's day. An' so on. We got gobs of offers, even from London."

No Title Dispute—Not Yet
But what about Promoter Mike Jacobs of New York, who had indicated that Krieger would meet the winner of the Fred Apostoli-Young Corbett bout slated for the Garden on Nov. 18? Jacobs indicated that Solly would meet the winner in January to settle the middleweight title dispute.

"There ain't no middleweight title dispute," declared Solly. "The national boxing association recognizes Krieger as champ. The New York Comish don't recognize nobody—not even the Apostoli-Corbett winner. New York and Mike Jacobs is just out of luck. They ain't got no champ yet."

Yes—yet! Because (today Caplin was to get the New York commis-

Badger Amateur Puck Body Meets at Fond du Lac

FOND DU LAC, Wis.—The tenth annual meeting of the Wisconsin Amateur Hockey Assn. has been called by Pres. John Farquhar, Madison, for Sunday at the Retlaw hotel here.

This year's meeting is attracting unusual interest because the association is expected to establish a policy on imported players. Disputes about "outside" talent culminated in a protest at the last tournament which threatened to force forfeitures.

Ten years ago Farquhar, then coaching at the University of Wisconsin, was instrumental in organizing the association similar to the Canadian system. Now the Wisconsin group is the largest of its kind in the United States.

Every hockey team, player or supporter in the state is invited to attend. The meeting will be called to order at 11 a. m.

The aim of the association is to foster and promote hockey in the state and to conduct a championship tournament at the end of the season. The Eagle River Falcons won the title last season with Wausau runner-up. Sixteen teams entered the tournament at State Fair park, Milwaukee. Milwaukee won the junior championship in a meet conducted by the American Legion.

Horner, Barkley to Dedicate Kentucky Bridge

CAIRO, Ill.—(U.P.)—Gov. Henry Horner of Illinois and U. S. Sen. Alben Barkley of Kentucky are expected to be among the dignitaries present at dedication of the \$2,185,809 toll bridge between Cairo and Wickliffe, Ky., PWA officials announced today.

The dedication exercises will be held at 10:30 a. m. Friday. The bridge, completed in June of this year, was started in 1936 under terms of a \$654,545 grant from the public works administration. It consists of five river spans and is just over a mile in length.

PWA engineers said the bridge will have a 60 foot clearance of the high water mark.
