Goal Line Stands Give NYU 13-7, Win Over Colgate

NEW YORK (U.P.)—A scrappy New York university team, seeking its first major victory of the season, struck twice in the first period and then made three goal-line stands in the final quarter to turn back a heavily favored Colgate eleven, 13-7, before a crowd of 25,000 in Yankee stadium.

The Red Raiders from the Chango valley, hoping to save its Coach Andy Kerr from suffering his eighth season with five defeats, unleashed a blazing attack in the second quarter but it wasn't enough to overcome the stubborn New Yorkers.

Three times in the final period Colgate, which ended its season Friday with only two victories and five defeats, drove close to a touchdown—to the 14-yard line, to the six inch line and to the one yard line. But NYU, which didn't even make a first down in the last half, hurled back all those drives.

Prairie du Chien Tips Boscobel, 14-7

Prairie du Chien high school's gridiron men scored in each of the first two periods here Friday afternoon to beat their Armistice day rival, Boscobel, by a 14-7 score and wind up in a fifth place tie with Wauwatosa in the Southwest Wisconsin conference.

The Prairie Dogs assumed the lead during the first period when their first touchdown, added another in the second quarter, and fought off Boscobel's threats in the second half to win. Coach Cecil Smith's gridgers started their first touchdown drive on their own 49. Frank Evans pitched a short pass to Bob Walker who galloped behind brilliant blocking to the Boscobel four-yard line.

Leroy Tippery, fullback, then netted a yard in each of two plays, skirred his own left end for the first touchdown, and Ray Benish went the same way for the extra point. A blocked punt on the Boscobel 20 set the stage for the second quarter score. Evans shot a pass to Walker for eight yards, and Eddie Benish made it first down on the 10 from where Ray Benish passed to Stan Hagman for the touchdown. Tippery converted the point with a plunge.

Boscobel went 40 yards on passes for its touchdown in the third period. Dick Hof passed to Darrell Gordinier for the score and Pat Baldwin, fullback, added the point with a plunge.
