Depict Air's History Today, "This Is Radio" Shows Broadcast's Rise



Templeton Fox, lovely young actor, is heard in the appealing role of the missionary's daughter in "This Day Is Ours," new up-to-date serial heard in the early afternoon over CBS. The locale is warring China and the story is hailed as "modern as tomorrow's newspaper."

Frank Craven, distinguished actor and his son, John, will play the leading roles of father and son in "This Is Radio," a one-hour original play to be broadcast at 10 a. m. over WIBA, WLS, WMAQ.

The history of radio forms the background for the four-act play, written by Thomas Langan of the NBC script division as a salute to the 160 affiliated stations of the two NBC coast-to-coast networks, Joseph S. Boll directs.

Craven and his son are now playing leading roles on Broadway in Thornton Wilder's Pulitzer prize play, "Our Town." Craven has been starred in dramatic productions in this country and abroad almost continuously since his first appearance on the stage as a child actor in 1893.

"This Is Radio" will dramatize the careers of two dream builders, Ken Walker and Connie Marshall. Both grew up with radio from the days of crystal sets, but their romance almost founders in the rough waters of success.

Ken, as a boy of 15, wins his doubting father over to immature radio when his crystal set picks up the Harding-Cox presidential election returns in November, 1920. He and his father are put on the air. After college, Ken goes to Pittsburgh to become an announcer and marries Connie Marshall, attractive young singer.

Their adventures lead to New York, where they join the newly organized National Broadcasting co. They see radio develop, and their careers sweep through the highlights of radio history. Other headlines today, classified:

County's Sportsmen Asked to Cooperate

Wisconsin's big game season opens next Saturday and many Dane county hunters are planning to be in the north woods for the opening day, the Dane County Sportsmen's league reported Saturday.

Both the bear and deer seasons open Saturday to continue to Nov. 25. No one shall shoot before one-half hour before sunrise or after one-half hour after sunset.

The league asked hunters who plan northern trips to be careful in handling cars and guns.

Control Welcomed

"The conservation department is setting up an elaborate system of supervision for this hunting season, and sportsmen should welcome this system of control," said Art Kniesley, president of the league.

"Chances are your car will be stopped at a checking station and you owe it to the state and to the rest of the sportsmen to cooperate with every effort toward an orderly hunting season."

"Every man going north is entitled to one forked-horn buck if he is able to get possession of it legally and all of us are opposed to deer bottleging and to general violations of the common rights of all. Every sportsman will facilitate any inspection any warden may care to make."

Deer Season Coming; Be Careful in North Woods, League Advises

Every sportsman will, of course, be equipped with both a hunting license and a deer tag and these will be available for inspection whenever requested.

"We emphasize the importance of the sport over the actual bag we may prize and to that end we urge 'be sure before you shoot'.

"Most hunters will be wearing red to be more readily distinguished from possible game and a law-abiding hunter will, of course, make sure that it is a pronged horn buck before he shoots at a deer."

"Moose are at large in several of the northern counties and there is no open season on them. One of these large animals was killed and left in the woods last season, and hunters are warned against a similar error this year."

"The adoption of the forked-horn rule of hunting deer, Wisconsin has been fortunate in avoiding accidents that formerly came because a man was mistaken for a deer. This season should continue that record of safety."

"The league is admonishing hunters that it is more satisfactory to return empty-handed than to know that you bagged your neighbor."

League Meets Wednesday The Dane county sportsmen will hold a regular meeting Wednesday in the Superior court room of the Dane county court house at 8 p. m. Deer hunting will be discussed by state conservation officials.

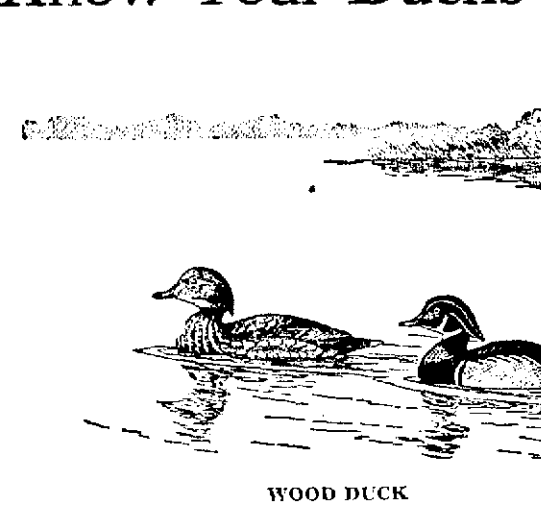
The prize for the best list will be one pass for two persons, good once on each change of program at the Orpheum theater, exclusive of stage shows, for one month.
