Vandenberg Sees Peril in 'Rule by Men'

DURHAM, N. C. —(U.P.)— Sen. Arthur H. Vandenberg, (R., Mich.) Friday night told a Duke university symposium on "Law in Modern Society" that there is danger of losing both liberty and security unless the American people have a "government of laws" and not a "government of men."

Vandenberg, outspoken critic of the present administration, asked whether there "is being witnessed today in the United States a breakdown, consciously or otherwise, in the constitutional theory of representative government?" "If so," he said, "the first necessity is to repair the breach. Otherwise, whatever else happens is of little moment. The stream of law can rise no higher than its source; and the pollution at the source is the final poison throughout the body politic."

He asserted that "in whatever degree we surrender a 'government of laws' to a 'government of men' we jeopardize the American inheritance."

Vandenberg declared the proper sphere of fundamental law is no different now than it was 150 years ago when a new charter of human rights and human liberty "rescued our swaddling republic from the curse of the ages."

"Modern society is at heart no different from colonial society in its attachment to free speech, free press, free religion, free assembly, free elections, free enterprise, free men and all the other freedoms that are typically and gloriously American," he said.
